To be recognized as Wisconsin Global Scholars, students need to complete:

Four (4) credits in one world language

Four (4) credits in courses with global content. One of those credits may be one year of a second world language.

Reflections on eight books (fiction or non-fiction) with a global focus. Alternately, up to four reflections may be on art, music, or film.

Participation in cultural activities.

A minimum of twenty (20) hours of global service learning.

Seniors who have completed all GEAC requirements are awarded certificates from Wisconsin's Department of Public Instruction and PHS. Seniors also wear designated GEAC cord for graduation ceremony. Transcripts will read "Global Scholar".
